

Splinters



Jean Sylvester is a typical, overthinking adolescent whose painful experience with parallel realities teaches her that while life involves her, it's not always all about her. She thinks life isn't fair and wishes hers was different. When she witnesses a traumatic accident, she can't help but blame herself for the events leading up to it. In order to be free of the nightmare she has a choice: she can spiral into despair or reconcile herself with the fact that terrible things happen, and some can't be changed.

Splinters is a story about so many things. It starts by looking at the change in our priorities as we move into our teenage years - our desperation for independence and happiness; our vulnerability to change; our misery when things don't turn out as we hoped. There are two things that let you down in life: high expectations and other people.

Rachel Delahaye was born in Australia but has lived in the UK since she was six years old. She lives in Bath and is married with two children and a dog called Rocket. Rachel's first book for Troika, Day of the Whale, was nominated for a Yoto Carnegie Medal for writing and her second book, Electric Life, published June 2023, has been long listed for a Carnegie Medal for Writing 2024.

In her first work of fiction Coral tells the story of ten-year-old Jakub Polanski who cares for his single mum, Maria, who has multiple sclerosis. The weight of responsibility has made Jakub forget he is a child, and his life outside of school is full of adult concerns. Everyone is worried about Jakub's mental health. His life is tough. To take the pressure off his mum and give Jakub a break, life-long family friends, the Koniks, take Jakub on holiday to Italy. While there Jakub learns about Marta's passion for writing poetry and storytelling, and she shows him that freedom and adventure are there for the taking. He discovers he is funny and smart and is not only defined by being a carer. And, in Italy. Jakub finds hope as he listens to an old. wise woodsman, who teaches him about otters, especially one injured otter, called Piccolo.

Coral Rumble is one of our most popular poets, Michael Rosen has commented, 'Rumble has a dash and delight about her work'. Coral performs and gives workshops at art centres, museums, bookshops, libraries, theatres and festivals, as well as in schools. This is her fourth book for Troika.



George trains in Scotland for his SOE mission to Poland to help the fighters in the Secret Army. After his work at Bletchley Park, John is now stationed in Cairo in Egypt working on plans to deceive Field Marshal Rommel about the location of the impending battle, while sister Eva in Hungary is finding life for anyone Jewish getting harder and harder as the Nazis harden their grip over the country. Will the siblings ever manage to get together? They share so many memories but war keeps

them apart.

Based on the extraordinary real-life experiences of Sue Klauber's father (Coding at Bletchley Park), uncle (SOE in Europe) and aunt (Resistance), she wrote **Zinc** and now **Cobal**t to illustrate the courage of her Jewish family.




Why Did My Brain Make Me Say it

In this debut collection for children Sarah takes the reader on a vibrant journey based on her acute observations of everyday life and language. Loosely arranged across a school year– September through Halloween, Christmas, Spring, Summer holidays, a new school year/just before secondary - Sarah's witty observations and playful use of language pervade every poem and bring a vivid charm and freshness to every page. This debut collection heralds the emergence of a striking new inventive voice in children's poetry.

Sarah Ziman was born and grew up in the South Wales valleys, and is STILL learning Welsh. She had a poem published in a book when she was 11, followed by one which travelled around as a poster on the London Underground when she was 13. She then had a little break of about 30 years, which she mostly spent lazing about eating crisps. She won the YorkMix Poems for Children Competition in 2021, has been highly commended for the Caterpillar Poetry Prize three times, and her poems can be found in magazines and anthologies worldwide.



You Are Not Alone



The poems in this collection chart Jay's journey from growing up in a working-class family in Leicestershire to his feelings and thoughts about school life and his experience as a transgender teenager. Jay says: When it was decided this collection would be for teenagers I was left with this determination, that this collection wouldn't speak down to anyone, that the world I portrayed within it would be the world we live in, that there would be no attempt to make reality 'appropriate for children'. People seem to forget that teenagers live in the same world as everyone else,

and they face the same struggles adults face every day. The things that are traditionally seen as inappropriate for young people to see, are so often the same things they experience day to day'

Jay Hulme is an award-winning poet and performer from Leicester, Winner of Slambassadors 2015, and finalist in the 2016 Roundhouse Poetry Slam. his work was Highly Commended in the 2018 CLiPPA Awards. He also works as an ambassador for Inclusive Minds, promoting inclusion and diversity in children's publishing, and doing sensitivity reads to ensure depictions of trans people in books are both accurate and unoffensive.





Hilda lives in Brighton. She is a regular visitor to schools and libraries where her author sessions are very popular.



She has produced films for refugee children from Columbia, Kurdistan, Kosovo, Afghanistan, Eritrea, Iran, Armenia and Romania, worked as lead fundraiser in an arts and social care charity and is now Trusts and Foundation Fundraiser for a charity where she monitors grants across areas of residential care, community centres, physical disability and Holocaust survivors' services.
