


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

A Language of Limbs

On a quiet night in 1972, two girls each make a choice...

One girl is caught kissing her best friend (also a girl) in her garden shed and is kicked out of home by her father. The other girl wakes from a sex dream she's had about her best friend (also a girl) who is sleeping over.

In alternating chapters poetically called Limb One and Limb Two, the novel follows these two unnamed women over three decades: one is living a queer life, one isn't. Their lives almost intersect in pivotal moments where the physical distance between them draws so thin that their bodies almost collide.

They each meet their first great love at a demonstration at Sydney University. Then their stories diverge, separated by vast distances through the AIDS crisis of the 1980s, until they experience the greatest loss of their lives in the same hospital with only walls separating their cries. To survive grief, one woman finds herself drawn to writing poetry about rivers and oceans, the other takes up ocean swimming.

Later, when the first woman finds the courage to submit her poetry collection for publication and the second, now working as an editor, reads the poems and sees herself. All that she has been repressing is brought to the surface with blistering realness. Breathless and with tears in her eyes, she picks up the phone to call the poet behind the poems.

A Language of Limbs is an intimate portrait of queer bodies, art, heartbreak, joy and the unseen connections that bind us.



DYLIN HARDCASTLE is an author, artist, and screenwriter. They are the author of three critically acclaimed books. Their most recent novel *Below Deck* was published in 10 territories. Dylin is the co-creator, co-writer and co-director of the TV show *Cloudy River*. In 2018, they were a Provost's Scholar and a research assistant in World Literature at the University of Oxford. Dylin is currently completing their PhD in Creative Writing. Dylin has travelled to Antarctica, South America and Europe for artist residencies, and has exhibited their paintings widely across Australia and the UK. *A Language of Limbs* has been optioned and is in development with Curio (Sony Pictures).



Bird


Bird has already died twenty-two times, each time just before her 15th birthday. Who can she trust to break the pattern?

17th century Himalayas. Bird escapes an arranged marriage and a life of humdrum servitude. She recruits her only friend Teshi, an untouchable, to flee with her. Propelled by the promise of a future of their own making, they disguise themselves as monks and vanish into the throng of pilgrims on the way to the Holy Mountain. Once there, Bird loses Teshi in the chaos and, camping alone, finds the body of a young woman floating in a lake. She soon realises there are no accidents here – there is violence circling the mountains, and now it has its eyes on her.

In a parallel story in modern-day Australia, Bird recruits her only friend, T, to steal a car for a joy ride. High and on a whim, she pulls a plastic gun on a petro station attendant, and a policeman shoots her in the shoulder. She is hospitalised, then ends up in juvenile prison. There, Bird is shunned by the other girls. Memories of her first life and the Holy Mountain return, and she faces the awful truth that she is stuck in a never-ending pattern. Every life, she dies alone before she reaches the age of 15. The lesson she has failed to learn so far is that to survive, she must learn to trust and can't liberate herself alone. When nurse Margie wants to help Bird, can she open herself up to trust her?



COURTNEY COLLINS is a writer and producer and a creative writing teacher. In 2017 she started Ngukurr Story Projects to support First Nations storytellers to tell stories in their traditional languages. Her first novel, *The Burial* (Allen & Unwin), was published in ten countries and shortlisted for the Stella Prize, the Nita B Kibble Literary Award and NSW Premier's Literary Awards for New Writing. It is being adapted as a feature film. Courtney holds a Masters of Creative Writing from the University of Melbourne. In 2019, she undertook initial research on *Bird* in the Himalayas as part of an AsiaLink Residency. Ada and Emmett are inexorably drawn together, but her future has been mapped out with the decorated returned soldier Donal Blaxland, a land-owner with a large tobacco plantation.


When police charges are brought against the lighthouse keeper, Ada is distraught and forced to make a choice about her future, but discovers that Donal, now her husband, harbours terrible secrets of his own. Soon she finds herself a prisoner to the trauma and suffering that war has wreaked on the returned soldier.

As she begins to understand the depths of Donal's desperation, she knows she must leave. Between the treacherous waters of the coast and the rocky outcrops of an ancient land, Ada is determined to live and love on her own terms.

A stirring, dramatic story about love and suffering, trauma and addiction – and hope in the darkest of times.

The Spoon and the Sea

An emotional race against time as mother and son empty the sea of secrets and stories between them – one memory at a time.

Ashi was nine years old when his mother left.

After decades apart, Ashi reunites with Rose who is growing old in the grips of dementia. Beneath the shade of Jerusalem's olive trees and eucalyptus leaves in the garden of Rose's care centre, they play at 'picking a year' and confront the memories that kept them apart.

Ashi slowly pieces together the twists and turns of his mother's life: a good Jewish girl from a London suburb post WWII, falling deeply in love with a Muslim student at Cambridge University, feeling torn between roots and love, escaping to British Mandate Palestine to be an intrepid journalist and later living a secret life in the Sultan's court of Zanzibar.

Peppered with colourful Yiddish and Arabic proverbs, *The Spoon and The Sea* invites readers to witness the delicate reconciliation between a mother and son, as they strive to bridge the emotional sea between them. An evocative dual timeline narrative about love and betrayal, generational loss and dementia.



RACHEL CAPLIN was born and raised in Australia. She holds a bachelor's degree in Communications and in Commerce from UWA, and a Masters of International Relations from the University of Melbourne. She relocated to Tel Aviv in 2015 to work in the vibrant tech industry. *The Spoon and the Sea* is Rachel's debut novel, inspired by an incredible true story in her family and the experience of losing her beloved grandmother to dementia. Layla Byrnes is exhausted. She's juggling a demanding job as an anaesthetist, a disintegrating marriage, her young kids, and a needy lover. And most particularly she's managing her histrionically unstable mother.

But this year, it's different. When her mother rings just before Christmas, she doesn't follow the usual script. Instead, she tells Layla that there's something important she needs to tell her about her much-loved father.

Mothers' Daughters (working title)

Two young women make their way in the world. What they have in common – being motherless – is also what sets them apart.

Raised in rural poverty in Australia, all Ava wants is security. Determined to change her life, she earns a PhD at Cambridge and marries a handsome, wealthy politician who catapults her to the heart of the British establishment. Desperate to be the ideal wife and prove herself, she commits academic fraud. To appease her husband, whose career will be tarnished by her drastic mistake, Ava finally resolves to give him the baby he wants in spite of the trauma of being abandoned by her mother.

Meanwhile, street-smart Cambridge journalist Laurie is determined to have a baby alone, overcoming her fears as her mother died in childbirth. Shortly before her due date, while investigating Ava, she uncovers the fraud. In the process, she inadvertently learns that her own father – a quirky professor of Marxist thinking – is not who he seems. Will she push away the man who raised her singlehandedly when her pregnancy turns life-threatening?

Mothers' Daughters charts the lives of Ava and Laurie, whose stories intersect at many levels before they finally meet. It subtly explores why some women obsessively want a child while others don't. Set during the 2010 UK student riots against the backdrop of university fee increases, it is a story of found family, class and social justice: funny, dark, hopeful and a little twisty.



ALISON EDWARDS was born in Australia but has lived and worked in UK/Europe for the last two decades. After studying journalism and German, she obtained her PhD in linguistics at the University of Cambridge, focusing on language ideologies and policy, particularly the ownership of English by non-native speakers. Her debut *Mother's Daughters* draws on that experience, especially the pressures on young academics. Alison now lives in Amsterdam with her family where she works as a freelance editor and translator. She started working on a new novel about a female Bansky-style artist set between NY and Amsterdam. When her boyfriend Max decides to enlist in the army, Marta is torn. It is 2015 and the fighting is in the Donbas region, thousands of kilometers away from the comfortable nest the young couple have built themselves in Lviv. Both have successful careers and live a cosy life, distant from politics and war. Until Max's decision.


With Max away, Marta tries hard to fit the model of a war hero's girlfriend and to embrace the new patriotic spirit. She volunteers for the Army, meeting other women whose partners are away fighting, but she struggles with letting the war into her life the way others do and her resentment towards Max builds.

At breaking point, one drunken night, Marta has a passionate liaison with a female friend. Then she jumps at an opportunity to travel to France where she meets Xavier. On the way to a party, they are separated in the chaos following a terrorist attack. Left with nothing but her purse, she has no idea what happened to Xavier nor how to find him.

Back home in Ukraine, depression sets in and she stops returning Max's phone calls. Marta realizes that the burden to conform is impeding her from living her true spirit. The idea of leaving Ukraine, mixed with guilt and bitterness takes hold of her.

HASKA SHYYAN is a writer, poet and translator. Born in Lviv where she co-owns a bookshop, Haska studied Classical Philology and wrote her first novel *Hunt, Doctor, Hunt!* on her cell phone while bedridden with a rare complication of meningitis called Hunt syndrome. *Behind Their Backs* was the first Ukrainian novel to receive the European Union Prize for Literature in 2019, as well as two Ukrainian literary awards (LltAccent Award and Espreso TV Readers Choice). She regularly contributes short stories and poetry to literary magazines. She currently lives in Brussels with her husband and daughter.





How do we give ourselves permission to be creative? This book explores two big forces – fear and joy – and offers a jump-start for the nervous heart of anyone whose desire to create is overruled by fear.

It is for people who yearn to write, as well as those who find their creativity elsewhere: gardeners, carpenters, sculptors, jewellery-makers, florists, songwriters, dancers, cooks, painters...anyone who wants to make something but doesn't because they're afraid. 
Damon Young reveals the big histories in our small, brief movements. Here, the past is not simply passed; not just a lump of dead sediment. Yesterday is alive in us today—as us. It lives through our flesh: our waving palms, bent knees, lifted chins.

With curiosity and wit, *Immortal Gestures* draws on a wide range of disciplines: philosophy, sociology, archaeology, psychology. It looks at everything from the plié of ballet to the finger guns of cinema; from handwashing in Islam to hand-waving in swordplay; from Miss Emma Woodhouse to Mister Spock.

Young is concerned literally with the worlds in our hands. He shows how our gestures are much more than they seem—and how we are much more than we seem.



DAMON YOUNG is a prize-winning philosopher and writer. His thirteen books include *The Art of Reading, How to Think About Exercise, Philosophy in the Garden* and *Distraction* and are published internationally. 
What will you be wearing tomorrow? Will your jacket have been grown in a lab, or your jeans coloured using bacteria? And where will your clothes go once you're done with them (because landfill is no longer an option)?

The fashion system as we know it is broken. It's wasteful, inefficient, polluting, exploitative, and if we carry on as we do now, could account for a quarter of global carbon emissions by 2050. But creative thinkers are dreaming up new ways to craft our sartorial identities that don't wreck the planet – perhaps your whole outfit will be virtual, with zero environmental impact.

From Vogue's first sustainability editor comes a compelling story of changing fashion in the most fundamental ways. Clare Press introduces us to the innovators - some big names, some hidden treasures - who are completely redesigning fashion. Ultimately, this book is about the deep-seated reasons we can't stop buying clothes, and argues why we should not have to. Because I'm Not Myself, You See A Memoir Of Motherhood, Madness And Coming Back From The Brink

A raw, hopeful and darkly funny memoir about the impossible pressures placed on new mothers and how quickly things can go dangerously wrong during 'the happiest time of your life'.

Ariane Beeston is a psychologist working for child protection when she gives birth to her first child – and experiences postnatal psychosis. As she navigates new motherhood, she suffers from scary delusions and hallucinations, which she keeps secret out of fear and shame.

Ariane is convinced something is physically wrong with her son, something she can't articulate. At times, the baby in the pram looks like a tiny red dragon. She panics when he develops nappy rash, certain that social services will know and remove him – just as she once removed other mother's babies as part of her job in frontline child protection.


Months pass and Ariane breaks further from reality, with thoughts of harming herself and her son. While trying to get help for sleeping issues, breastfeeding and psychiatric support, she faces conflicting advice and one setback after another in a stretched and fragmented system.

Finally admitted to a mother and baby psychiatric unit, Ariane is forced to learn how to be a patient. The shame of being in a psych ward as a psychologist and social worker is overwhelwing – and humbling.

Woven with research and expert commentary, Ariane joins a growing chorus of voices breaking down the taboo of maternal mental illness. *Because I'm not Myself You See* (paraphrased from Lewis Caroll) is also about life on the other side: trying to make sense of what doesn't make sense, and finding humour, beauty, joy and purpose.





It hasn't taken Tottenham Hotspur fans very long to fall completely in love with Ange Postecoglou.

She holds a Political Science degree from Chulalongkorn University and a Master's from Sydney University. Penjai grew up in Bangkok and has lived in Australia since 2017. MICHAEL RUFFLES is a journalist and chief sub-editor of *The Sydney Morning Herald*. He went to Thailand in 2001 as an exchange student and returned to work at the *Bangkok Post* from 2012 to 2016. In 2020 he was joint winner of a Kennedy Award for exposing the truth of a Thai cabinet minister's jail sentence for conspiring to import heroin into Australia.
