



And on Benny birthday, the book's climax, a closed double-spread serves as the door to the house of the guest of honor, which opens into a huge double-spread filled with heartbreaking emotion.



The Bird's Bakery features six-year-old Kai, who discovers his parents' bakery and café may have to close due to financial troubles. Kai is heartbroken, as the beloved bakery is his safe haven, there he helps his parents at the confectionery, every afternoon, after kindergarten. The bakery used to be bustling with customers clamoring for pastries and sweets. Now, for some unknown reason, it's empty - the only visitors are birds! But Kai's creative thinking and ingenuity lead to a fantastical plan for the bakery that could bring customers flocking back.

The Bird's Bakery is a flurry of fun with a powerful lesson: Little children can solve big problems, if adults let them spread their wings and fly. The book is, first and foremost, an entertaining story, but it also illustrates how every crisis offers potential for growth and opportunity. Facing the unknown can be scary, but if we take stock of everything around us, unexpected and unlikely answers often come. We just have to use our imaginations. The Birds' Bakery shows that everybody, including children, can change their reality. It also instills values such as kindness, generosity and an appreciation for nature, family, and strangers.

Tammy Brown-Elkeles is an author of children books, screenwriter and playwright. Her inteligent works have received extensive exposure in the media (TV, radio, blogs, magazines and newspapers). She frequently speaks about literature and books at schools and other venues, and has been teaching kids how to elaborate creative thinking.



When a child changes his mind about something he deserves all the praise and the respect!

This charmingly illustrated tale makes a perfect bedtime story for energetic kids everywhere.



Every little child who has ever ridden on a bicycle with an adult has faced the same problem: the adult sits in front and blocks everything ahead from the view of the child behind him. *In Grandpa's Back Blocks Everything*, the author describes this sweet-and-sour experience, telling the story of a grandson taken by his grandfather on a bike-ride through the city with great charm. On the one hand, the grandfather's familiar back provides a sense of security and confidence. On the other hand, it hides everything that interests the little child (cats, people, streetlights and roads). The world reveals itself from above, from below and from either side, but the curious child wants to see the complete picture, to see everything. This is an amusing and original story told from the unique point of view of a child. It explores inter-generational relationships and the love and adventure that comprises them.

When We Had Wings | When We Flew Away Tami Shem-Tov

Two volumes of an exceptional humanistic literary work about the world's first democratic orphanage.

When We Had Wings won Andersen Honor Citation 2014, Lea Goldberg Prize 2013, Dafdaf prize 2012, Israeli Public Libraries Prize, was chosen for the Israeli Ministry of Education recommended school book list, selected as most beloved book by students for 2014 and 2015, and became a bestseller.

When We Had Wings is a novel for young readers based on true stories from the world's first democratic orphanage. The institute was founded in Warsaw, Poland, in 1912 by Janusz Korczak, a revolutionary pedagogue, pediatrician and writer who dedicated his life to children and their right to live in dignity. For thirty years, the institute, self-managed by the children, served as a loving home for hundreds. It had a court, a constitution and a newspaper, and provided a self-supporting system. The children enjoyed culture and sports, and all worked as cooks and cleaners. They called it a "Garden of Eden for kids". In the novel, the main character, Janek Wolff, is a street boy and thief who joins the orphanage. As was often the case, life there enabled him to find the strength to become a strong, honest and caring person. The novel ends before the beginning of World War II, as Korczak persuades Janek to leave Poland and save his life. Icho and Rosie couldn't stand each other at Janusz Korczak's orphanage, but now that the whole world was at war, they had to join forces in order to survive. With despair growing all around them, they won't lose hope thanks to the wonderful things they learned from Korczak, the educator who truly understood children. Where will the road take them on their dangerous escape journey from their homeland, and will they realize their dream of meeting their friend Janek on the shores of Tel Aviv?

The story of great discoveries is the story of the scientists who discovered them. It is the story of the people who did the inconceivable, who saw first what others could not have even imagined. The series *Inventors and Discoverers* exposes children to the greatest scientists in history and their personal lives. It explains how scientists think, what questions they ask, and how they do their research and invent. It describes with clear explanations the scientists' interests and the nature of their experiments, explanations which enable children to understand and appreciate the importance of their achievements.

The stories invite readers to visit a world where people did not know how to fly, had no electricity to illuminate their houses, could not to speak to each other from a distance, and the mysteries of space and human beings, like many other secrets of nature, were not known to them. Children who read these stories will grasp, perhaps for the first time, the nature of scientific work, its implications for human lives, what it demands and what it affords. The Most Boring Book in The World Nana Ariel

"You get ideas from daydreaming. You get ideas from being bored", Neil Gaiman "Boredom allows one to indulge in curiosity", Steve Jobs

The Most Boring Book In The World delves into one of children's (and adults') most interesting emotions: boredom. Staring, wondering, yawning, restlessly searching after something to do, resting, falling asleep. What happens to us when we get bored? Do we allow ourselves to be bored? And what happens

when the grudge against boredom turns into a creative search and discovery of the unexpected?

This is a book without pictures or conversations, only words and abstract shapes; a book that trusts the imagination, humor and curiosity of children. It doesn't ask readers to get carried away in a plot, but rather to constantly remember that they are reading a book: touching it, getting a closer look, looking at the margins, coming back to center, and imagining what is absent.

This is, perhaps, the book Alice's sister was reading – a book without any colorful and exciting adventures. But it was only through boredom that Wonderland opened up to her.

Alice was beginning to get very tired of sitting by her sister on the bank, and of having nothing to do: once or twice she had peeped into the book her sister was reading, but it had no pictures or conversations in it, "and what is the use of a book," thought Alice, "without pictures or conversations?"



 Greenlandic Tales Henry Rink Illustartion: Orianne Shavit

Greenlandic Tales includes four stories drawn from the oral tradition of the Inuit of Greenland. These stories are hundreds of years old, and are rich in magic and enchantment. Each story reflects different facets of Inuit beliefs, values, traditions and ways of life as hunter-gatherers in the unique arctic environment. A brief introduction provides background on Inuit culture, and an illustrated dictionary explains terms that appear in the stories and their context within Inuit culture. The illustrations that accompany the stories, drawn by Orianne Shavit, are based on her research of visual aspects of Greenlandic Inuit culture, from clothing and hairstyles to instruments and art, as well as on the natural landscapes and animals found in the Greenlandic arctic.

The stories in this collection were first published in the nineteenth century by **Henry Rink**, in his book *Tales and Traditions of the Eskimo*. Rink, a Dane who lived in Greenland for many years, collected and translated these stories, first to Danish and later to English. His book is considered to be the first publication of Inuit tales. From among the approximately 150 stories found in Rink's collection, we selected four that would be suitable for children without any revision or alternation.

Designing the Mind Engineering Our Behavior and Feelings in the Digital World Liraz Margalit

What do we know about the thin metal device that has been attached to us as if it was one of our own organs? Do we play with it, or does it play with us? In this book Dr. Liraz Margalit reveals what we do not know about it, or – more precisely – what Tech Giants do not want us to know about the smartphone and the hidden operations done by application developers, whose ultimate goal is clearly to trap us in it for their own

benefit. While most of us believe that we live in a world of endless options and free self-decisions, our choices are channeled by forces outside ourselves. Not only are our choices of what to eat, what to drink, which restaurant to choose or which vacation to book, are not spontaneously made in our consciousness, but neither are our cardinal life choices and decisions, such as our mate, profession, pension plan, financial investment tracks, and so forth.

The book's claim is that tech companies today have reached a point in history where they became most effective in controlling human brains. It surfases the multitude manipulations and complex techniques of taking control over our consciousness. The author presents theoretical and research-based principles and explains the psychology behind the technology in clear language to a general readership; and, on the other hand, analyzes the user behavior and describes the elements that activate the brain's pleasure centers, sometimes to the point of acute addiction. The author also uncovers how certain popular apps and social networks are designed to trigger the users' most basic emotions to a point of total psychological dependence on them.

In *Designing the Mind* - written by someone who used to operate behind the scenes, working for the most influential companies in the world, advising them as to how to manipulate users – the author sharply points out the heavy price digital development exacts, particularly the emotional price, and openly criticizes this world where she was an active player previously.

Dr. Liraz Margalit is a social psychologist with a PhD. in psychology who specializes in game theory and behavioral economics. She lectures at the prestigious Herzliya Interdisciplinary Center, is a frequent media interviewee, and writes a popular column titled "Behind Online Behavior" in Psychology Today as well as another column in the business magazine CMSWire, which has twice awarded her "Writer of the Year," in 2017 and 2020.

Maqluba is a love story, told in two voices, between Osama, a Palestinian professor who is trapped in the West Bank city of Ramallah and Sari, an Israeli-American lawyer and ultra-marathon runner, who represents him before the Israeli authorities, as he seeks to travel between Ramallah and the outside world.

Osama was born in Gaza and moved to the city of Ramallah 25 years ago. He is trapped in Ramallah, because the Israeli authorities deny his right to live in Ramallah and therefore will not allow him to return to home, should he leave the city. He longs to travel to conferences and to visit his mother, the sea, and the remnants of his childhood in the Jabalia Refugee Camp in the Gaza Strip.

Sari is an American-born human rights lawyer whose passion for freedom of movement leads her to cross the scarred and beautiful landscape of the West Bank and to take on the Israeli military authorities in court battles on behalf of Osama and others subject to travel restrictions.

The book reflects their attempt to find their place in Israeli society and Palestinian society and to find their way back to each other. Through Osama, Sari begins to learn Arabic, the mother tongue that her father cast aside after fleeing Iraq as a child. Through Sari, Osama gets a different view of the Israel he once knew, as a laborer on Israeli construction sites and a prisoner in Israeli military jails. The characters' attempt to maintain their relationship in nearly impossible circumstances exposes readers to the intimacy, alienation and domination that the half-century long military occupation of Palestine has created between Palestinians and Israelis.

Sari Bashi is a lawyer, consultant, writer and researcher, with expertise in international humanitarian law and human rights law, the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, the Palestinian economy and human rights movements around the world. She lectures in Israel and abroad, writes opinion articles, frequently interview in the media and writes a blog in Hebrew and English under a pen name in Haaretz daily newspaper. Sari is a long-distance runner and holds the Israeli record for women of 216 km ultra-marathon in 2012.

Protect the Song Bird Poetic Testimony of Afghan Women Tsila Zan-Bar Tsur

"Who sold you?" "Who could sell me? My father sold me. Not whole, In bits and pieces he sold me. My heart, my liver, my eyes, My mouth, my braids of black, Not for a high price. And My cunt he sold for Two sacks of ginger. No. I don't have children. I have no organs of my own I'm fixed. Will you be my daughter?"

Protect the Song Bird is a poignant testimony of Afghan women. It brings strong voices of suppressed women through authentic colors, tastes, spices and exotic fragrance of the Afghan intriguing culture. It expresses the cry froze in their throats for generations strongly and openly. They tell about their cruel destiny since childhood when they were forced to marry and leave their father's house at the age of 11-12; They describe the act of rape at the wedding night of 12 years old girls and their helplessness; and they reveal their subversive abilities to study under supressive regime. It is painfully told and read, but no work tells it in such refine colors, pleasurable beauty, alongside deep sensitivity toward life next to nature, growing out of attentiveness to its inner beats.

The author herself is the child of Afghan Jews, and her poems are strongly influenced by her work as a researcher, by testimonies of her grandmother, her female family members and Afghan refugees women, some of whom were resistance poetesses belonging to the "Golden Needle" group – a code name for poetesses and female authors who founded a sewing school in which they were active in the underground during the rule of the Taliban in the period it was forbidden for women to leave the house or to study. They put sewing kits in their schoolbags, threads and fabrics, and under them they hid books of poetry, literary criticism and prose.

Dr. Tsila Zan-Bar Tsur researches the folklore of Afghan women and lectures in academia on folklore, gender and art in society. She has written books of prose and poetry and officiates at life-passage rituals for women in the spirit of the wisdom of Afghan women.
